Temporary Accommodation

If you're coming to stay in New Zealand for Clinical Placement, or wish to stay somewhere temporarily before finding a more permanent place to stay, APC recommends individuals review websites such as booking.com, airbnb, stayz or similar websites to find local and affordable accommodation.

Transport

A great perk of New Zealand is the multiple options you have to travel across the country (or city to city).

One of the most popular ways to travel in New Zealand is via its bus systems. Offering a hop-on/hop-off service allows for flexibility around your travelling needs nationally. There are also train/ferry options for those wishing to travel more distance during their stay in New Zealand.

Ride-sharing options such as '<u>Uber'</u>, '<u>DiDi'</u>, <u>Blue Bubble Taxis</u> and others are prominent within New Zealand to offer transport via car, but of course, there are plenty of <u>car hire companies</u> one can choose from if you wish to travel privately.

For those wishing to travel from island-to-island, flights can be purchased on websites such as webject.com.au.

Driving in New Zealand with an Overseas Licence

Please ensure to review your licence's permissions before hiring, driving or purchasing a car in New Zealand.

For those travelling from Australia as of January 2024, you can generally use your Australian driver's licence for the first 12 months after arriving in New Zealand. You must then apply for a New Zealand driver's licence.*
